

# ACADEMIC ASPECTS

#### A. STREAM:

The college imparts education in thirteen subjects in Higher Secondary Course under Assam Higher Secondary Education Council (AHSEC) and Under Graduate courses including both Major and General Courses under Dibrugarh University. The college has started the science stream at the HS level from the academic session of 2018-19.

#### **B. WORKING HOURS:**

The day shift classes are held in normal working hours starting from 09:00 A.M. onwards.

The working hours for Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (KKHSOU) are on Sunday and for distance education as per class routines.

#### C. COLLEGE LIBRARY FACILITY:

The college has a large and rich library with a good number of books including rare publications besides a good collection of reference books and journals in all subjects. A good number of daily and weekly newspapers are also subscribed for all readers. Separate reading rooms for the students and the faculty members are also available in the library. The library is digitalized. Every department also has its separate library with a good collection of valuable books. The library is open from 09.00 A. M. to 05.00 P.M. from Monday to Saturday. Every student must adhere to the following rules regarding the central library:

a. Students must wear their college uniform while entering the library.

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- b. Students must keep their identity card with them.
- c. Students are allowed to read and borrow library books every day.
- d. Students must renew or register their borrowed books at every fortnight.
- e. Students must return their identity card and the borrowed books before every final examination.
- f. Students must submit their library clearance certificate along with their examination forms.
- g. Students will have to pay fine for loss or damage done to the library books.

#### D. ATTENDANCE:

Minimum 80 percent attendance in classes is compulsory for all students under the semester system. In the case of Higher Secondary level, a student must attend at least 60% of classes held, failing which she shall be declared non-collegiate and those failing to attend 50% of the classes will be declared dis-collegiate.

#### E. MENTOR:

With a view to assisting the students the college authority introduced, from the 2014-2015 session, the system of appointing MENTORS to look after the students put under their supervision.

#### F. EXAMINATION:

In-semester Examinations for Degree students and Test Examinations for H. S. students are held during every academic session. Unit Tests are also held regularly. Appearing in all the examinations is compulsory for all the students.

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#### G. HOSTEL ACCOMMODATION:

i.) The college has hostel accommodation for deserving meritorious students within the campus. The hostel is managed by the college under hostel rules. Adequate care is taken to provide all necessary facilities to the boarders.

ii) Allotment of hostel seats is made strictly on merit and distance basis. In allotting seats, students from the tea-garden community are given preference.

iii) A few seats are also reserved for ST/ SC. The hostel is run by wardens selected from among the faculty members. A Matron and Chowkidar for both day and night are provided for the care and safety of the boarders.

iv) All boarders have to maintain strict discipline as per the hostel rules. Violation will invite punitive action even to the extent of expulsion from the hostel and the college.

#### GENERAL RULES:

The college authority is very keen on maintaining discipline and a healthy academic atmosphere on the college premises. All students are expected to strictly follow rules of discipline, maintain decorum in dress and behaviour, and observe cleanliness which is essential to any institution of learning. Violation of rules, unsatisfactory progress, irregular attendance, showing discourtesy to the teachers and staff members in any form, adopting unfair means in examination etc. are some of the offenses which may call for disciplinary action like termination of scholarship, forced transfer, and expulsion from the college and hostel.

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# CODE OF CONDUCT

Hemo Prova Borbora Girls' College is committed to providing a framework for attending to students' welfare needs individually and collectively by creating an environment in the college in which all can live, work, and learn together in peace and harmony. The policy is designed to provide assistance and guidance that develops students into good and honest citizens while at the same time dealing with behavior or actions that may be inconsistent with college policies. It is an undeniable claim that every child has the right to education it is also equally important that a student should be aware of his/her duties being a student. The following are the code of ethics that a student of the college is expected to follow:

- 1. The College admits students without regard to race, creed, color, disability, age, national or ethnic origin. All students have equal access to the facilities, financial aid, and programs of the college and are expected to show mutual respect to one another.
- 2. A student shall abide by the rules and regulations of the College and should act in a way that highlights the discipline and esteem of the College.
- A six-day working schedule from Monday to Saturday is followed. Classes are scheduled from 9.00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. All the students are expected to be present in the class within a stipulated time. Discipline and decorum must be maintained during class hours.
- 4. No student shall enter or leave the classroom during class hours without the permission of the teacher concerned.
- 5. Students are expected not to waste time and loiter about on the campus during class hours.
- 6. All leave applications (Regular & Medical) shall be submitted in time, for sanction by HoD and concerned teachers. Application for medical leave shall be accompanied by valid medical certificates.

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- 7. A student is expected to attend all classes and functions in college uniform.
- 8. Students are expected to wear clean, decent clothes and conform to the rules of modesty and dress code of the college.
- 9. Regularity in attendance is obligatory.
- 10. A student is expected to maintain silence in academic buildings, especially during class hours. Hooting, whistling, loitering, etc. will be treated as an instance of indiscipline.
- 11. Consumption of prohibited substances is strictly prohibited on and off-campus.
- 12. Students shall refrain from activities such as unnecessary writing on the walls, doors, or furniture.
- 13. Damages done to college property by students must be repaired or paid half the amount by the concerned student/s.
- 14. Students are not permitted to arrange any unauthorized celebrations and decorations of any magnitude on the campus.
- 15. Students shall not distribute or display (both physically and electroni cally) material such as notices, banners, etc. on campus without the permission of the competent authority.
- 16. Students shall make use of every opportunity that is made available to strive towards academic excellence, skill, and holistic development.
- 17. Students who intend to represent the college in intercollegiate events shall take prior permission from the concerned head of the depart ment and the selection will be based on parameters such as academic performance, attendance, character, existing academic pressure, and competence of the student in the proposed event for participation.
- 18. Student Forums, Societies, and Associations shall be subjected to such guidance and control as the college administration may

### ADMISSION PROCEDURE

i.) Prescribed Application Form along with the Information Brochure may be obtained against cash payment of Rs. 250/- (Two hundred Fifty) only from the office of the college as per public notification issued from the college authority.

ii) Application Forms for admission into Higher Secondary and Undergraduate courses are issued immediately after the announcement of the result of theH.S.L.C. (SEBA) and the H.S. (AHSEC) Examination along with the Information Brochure of the college.

iii) Students seeking admission must submit their duly filled up admission forms along with the attested copies of admit card, mark-sheet, pass certificate for the qualifying examinations and other supporting documents i. e. S.T. (P)/ S.T. (H)/ S.C. / O.B.C./ O.M.B.C./ Differently Able Certificate as well as the certificate of proficiency in co-curricular activates of national/ state level etc. on or before the last date notified. Scrutiny of application forms and finalizing the list of selected students are done by Admission Committee. Admission is made strictly on merit and subject to the approval of the college authority.
